The Michigan Appropriateness Guide for Intravenous Catheters (MAGIC): Results from a Multispecialty Panel Using the RAND/UCLA Appropriateness Method

Patients admitted to acute care frequently require intravenous access to effectively deliver prescribed treatment. For patients with difficult intravenous access, those requiring multiple attempts, those who are obese, or have diabetes or other chronic conditions, determining the vascular access device (VAD) with the lowest risk that best meets the needs of the treatment plan can be confusing.

Selection of a VAD should be based on specific indications for that device to avoid the potentially serious complications of infection and/or thrombosis. In the clinical setting, requests for central venous access devices are frequently precipitated by failure to establish peripheral access. An international panel of experts convened to establish a guide for indications and appropriate usage for VADs. This webinar summarises the work and recommendations of the panel for the Michigan Appropriateness Guide for Intravenous Catheters (MAGIC).
